* God's undeserved generosity is evident throughout the Bible, and it is perfectly expressed in Jesus.

** The Bible, from 'the fall' onwards, describes God's plan of salvation through his Son. Thus, *all* the Scriptures speak in some way of Jesus (Luke 24:27)

Background to Mark's Gospel

Mark's Gospel is thought to have been written by John Mark, from the preaching of Peter, during the 60s AD.

We get quite a few clues about John Mark in the New Testament:

When Peter was in prison, facing execution, the church was praying for him in the house of Mark's mother. (Acts 12:12)

Paul and Barnabas took Mark on the first missionary journey, but since he went home part way through, Paul declined to take him a second time. Instead, Barnabas took Mark on a different trip. (Acts 13:5,13; 15:37,39)

We learn in Colossians 4:10 that Mark and Barnabas were cousins.

Paul tells Timothy to 'get Mark and bring him with you, because he is helpful to me in my ministry'. (2 Timothy 4:11)

Paul calls Mark, 'my fellow worker'. (Philemon 24)

Peter, writing from Rome (he gives it the code name 'Babylon') calls Mark his 'son', which is more likely to be figurative than literal. (1 Peter 5:13)

Of the four gospel writers, only Mark mentions the incident in 14:51-52. Could he himself be the youth escaping in the Garden of Gethsemane? If so, our first glimpse of this esteemed Gospel writer is of him 'streaking'!

Persecution of Christians in Rome under Nero was killing the eyewitnesses of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. It was imperative to gather the existing narratives and teaching of Jesus, commit them to writing, make copies and distribute them widely, in case some were destroyed.

Mark makes much use of the term, 'Immediately,' when introducing a new section. This gives a sense of urgency to the narrative. Matthew and Luke often echo the order of events in Mark, but include more of Jesus' teaching. Mark may have been interrupted when writing at 16:8, as the Greek ends in a clumsy way, and the oldest manuscripts stop there.

If so, it must have been to escape imminent danger. His first readers well knew the experience.

46 *Jericho* City in Jordan valley, 15 miles NE of Jerusalem, and over 3,000 feet below it, on the main route south down the valley from Galilee. Last stop before dangerous ascent to Jerusalem.

Timaeus means 'defiled'; *Bartimaeus* = 'son of the defiled one'

47 *Son of David* Title for the Messiah, the awaited King

50 *cloak* A beggar's most important possession. Protects night & day

51 *rabbi* Means teacher.

52 *healed* Literal meaning is 'saved'

Bible Connections

46 *Jericho* The city that barred Israel's way to the promised land (Joshua 5:10). Destroyed and never to be rebuilt, on pain of death (Joshua 6:26).

47 *Son of David* c.f. Mark 11:10 - The crowds sang 'blessed is the coming of Kingdom of our father, David.
c.f.1 Chronicles 17:14 - An eternal kingdom had been promised under the rule of a son of King David

52 *healed/saved by faith* Compare Ephesians 2:8,9.

Jesus is the peaceful saviour

1 *Jerusalem* ‘Capital’ of Holy land with the Temple.

Bethphage / Bethany Villages outside Jerusalem (1- 2 miles)

Mount of Olives Small hill opposite Jerusalem on route from Bethany

2 *colt* Foal of an ass. Transport of a King coming in peace

3 *The Lord* coinciding with the words used when reading the OT, to avoid saying ‘Yahweh’, the God of Israel.

^c 7 *Cloaks* Outer garment.

9 *hosanna* an exclamation of praise; literally, ‘save now’.

10 *Kingdom of David* the territory of David, a former King of Israel.

11 *The Temple* Centre of Jewish religion, where God's presence was manifest. Where sacrifices were made.

The twelve The disciples Jesus had chosen.

15 *Temple area* The outer courtyard was as far as Gentiles could go. It was meant to be place of prayer for them, but also a place of preparation for Jews to go further in.

money changers Roman coins in everyday use were secular. So Temple tax, and purchase of ‘spotless’ lambs, had to be paid for in Jewish-approved shekels. With a monopoly, changers made extortionate profit on other currencies.

doves a poor man’s sacrifice (Leviticus 12:8; 14:22; 15:14).
(nb *Sacrifice expresses the need for the forgiveness of sin and to restore the relationship between man and God*)

18 *chief priests* those in charge of Temple sacrifices.

teachers of the Law Scribes and Pharisees.

13 *fig tree* symbol of Israel at peace 1 Kings 4:25;

25 *forgiveness of others* Matthew 6:12; 17:21-35; Luke 23:34

a baptism for the forgiveness of sins in preparation for one who would baptise in the Holy Spirit (Mark 1:4,7)

32 *a prophet*

one who speaks God's word on his behalf

1	<i>parable</i>	A story with one main point. (cf an allegory in which every detail of a story has another meaning eg 'Pilgrim's Progress')
	<i>vineyard</i>	A field for growing vines to produce grapes.
	<i>wine press</i>	e.g. two hollows in rock, one for trampling grapes, the other at a lower level so the juice could run into it.
	<i>watchtower</i>	So that a farmer could guard his vineyard at a time when thieves might steal the ripe grapes.
7	<i>heir</i>	Son of the owner.
	<i>capstone or cornerstone</i>	A vitally important stone in a building that give it its stability or alignment.
